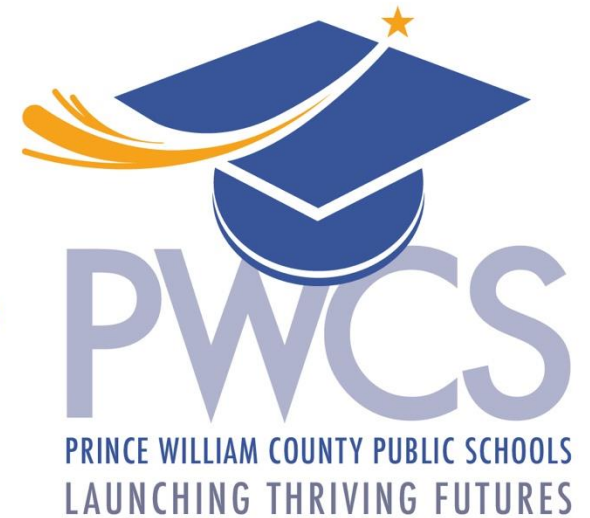

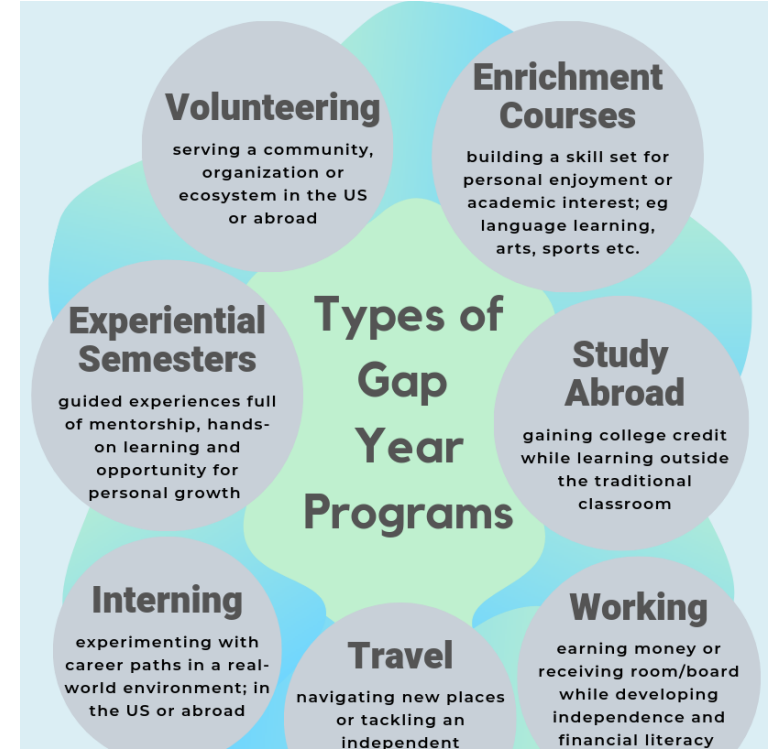

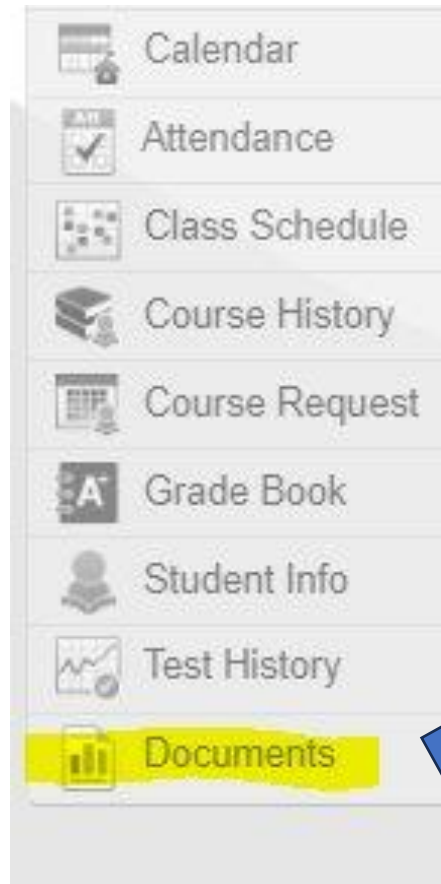

The PWCS Vision is that every student will graduate on time with the knowledge, skills, and habits of mind necessary to create a thriving future for themselves and their community.

Key Concepts

Advanced Academics: Classes such as AP, IB, Cambridge, CTE, or Dual Enrollment where you earn weight in your GPA and have the potential to earn college credit. Search the college registrar's website for [transfer credit](#) standards.

Certification or Credential: A certificate is an official document that proves you've completed a course or achieved a particular skill. A credential is a broader term that refers to a qualification or achievement.

Financial Aid: Funds such as loans or grants that are provided to help pay tuition, fees, and other educational expenses.

Grade Point Average (GPA): Weighted GPA reflects the difficulty of the courses you take, giving extra points such as 5.0 representing A. Unweighted GPA, on the other hand, doesn't consider course difficulty and uses a simple 4.0 scale where an A equals 4.0.

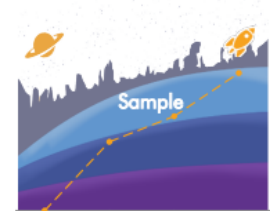

What is the *George Mason Direct Admissions Program*?

The **George Mason Direct Admissions Program** is a partnership program between George Mason and local high schools to offer admission to high-achieving students with a **3.25+ GPA AND required courses**.

What are the Benefits?

The college application and admissions process can be cumbersome and stressful at times, but the program's **simplified application** and admissions process provides students the peace of mind that a college acceptance waits for them on the other side.

How are students selected?

Partner high schools provide George Mason with the necessary information about their students. All students who meet the set academic requirements are admitted to George Mason after completing a simplified application process.

Is there anything students need to do before completing the Direct Admission application?

Yes! Parents must opt-in to give consent to share student information with the Office of Admissions. Consent must be given in PARENT VUE (return to school packet).

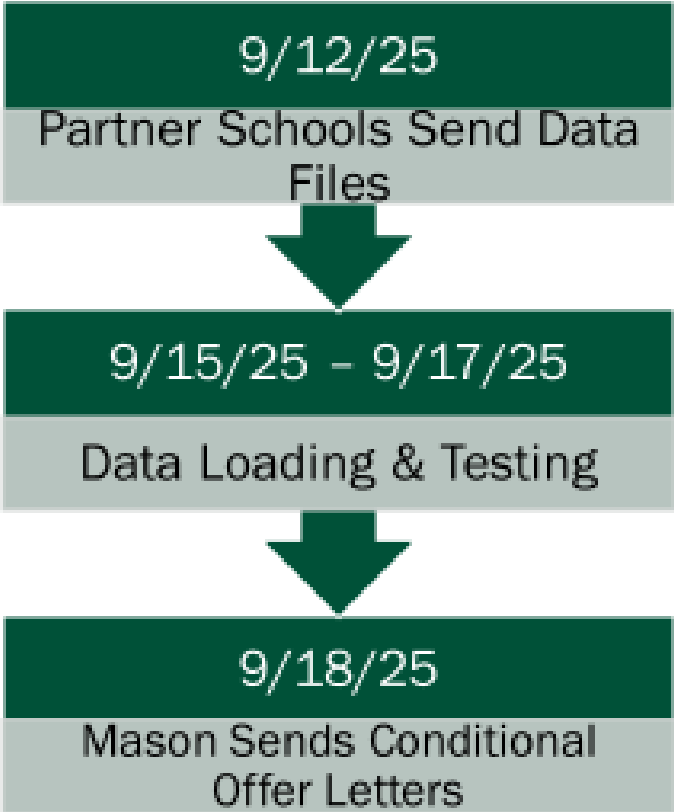

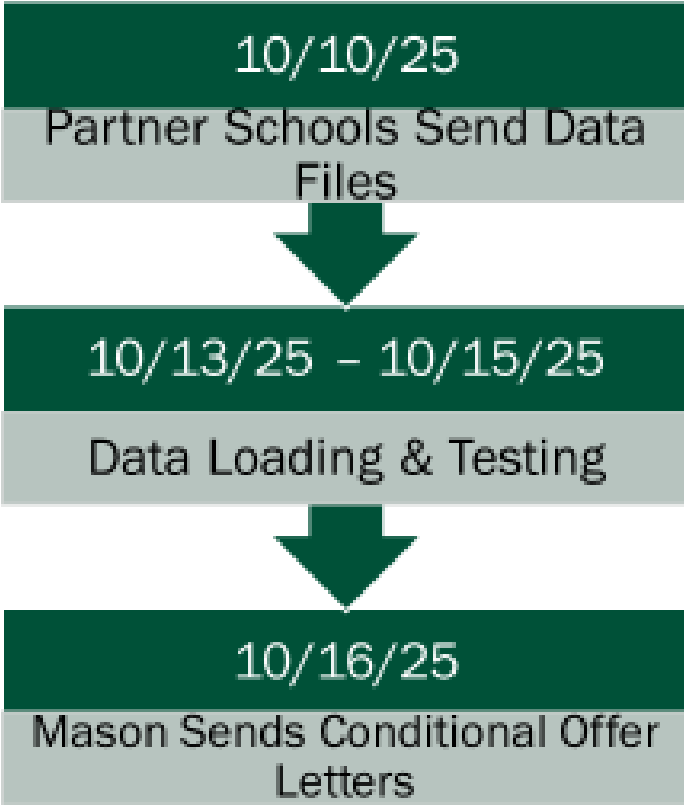


Direct Admissions Timeline for 2025-2026

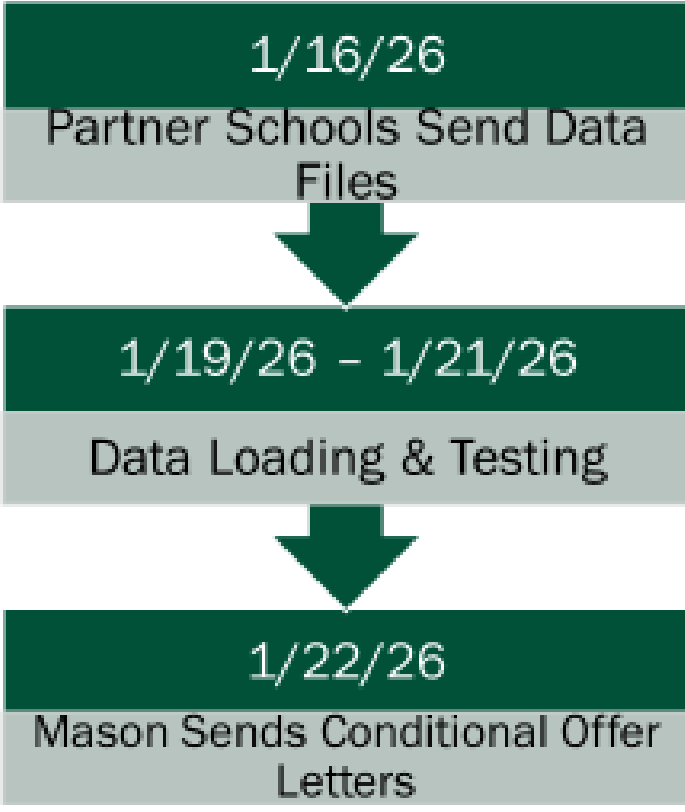

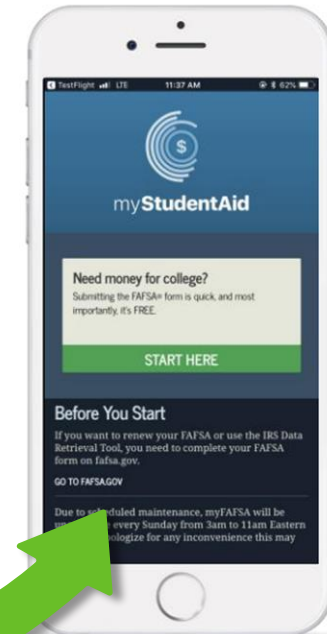

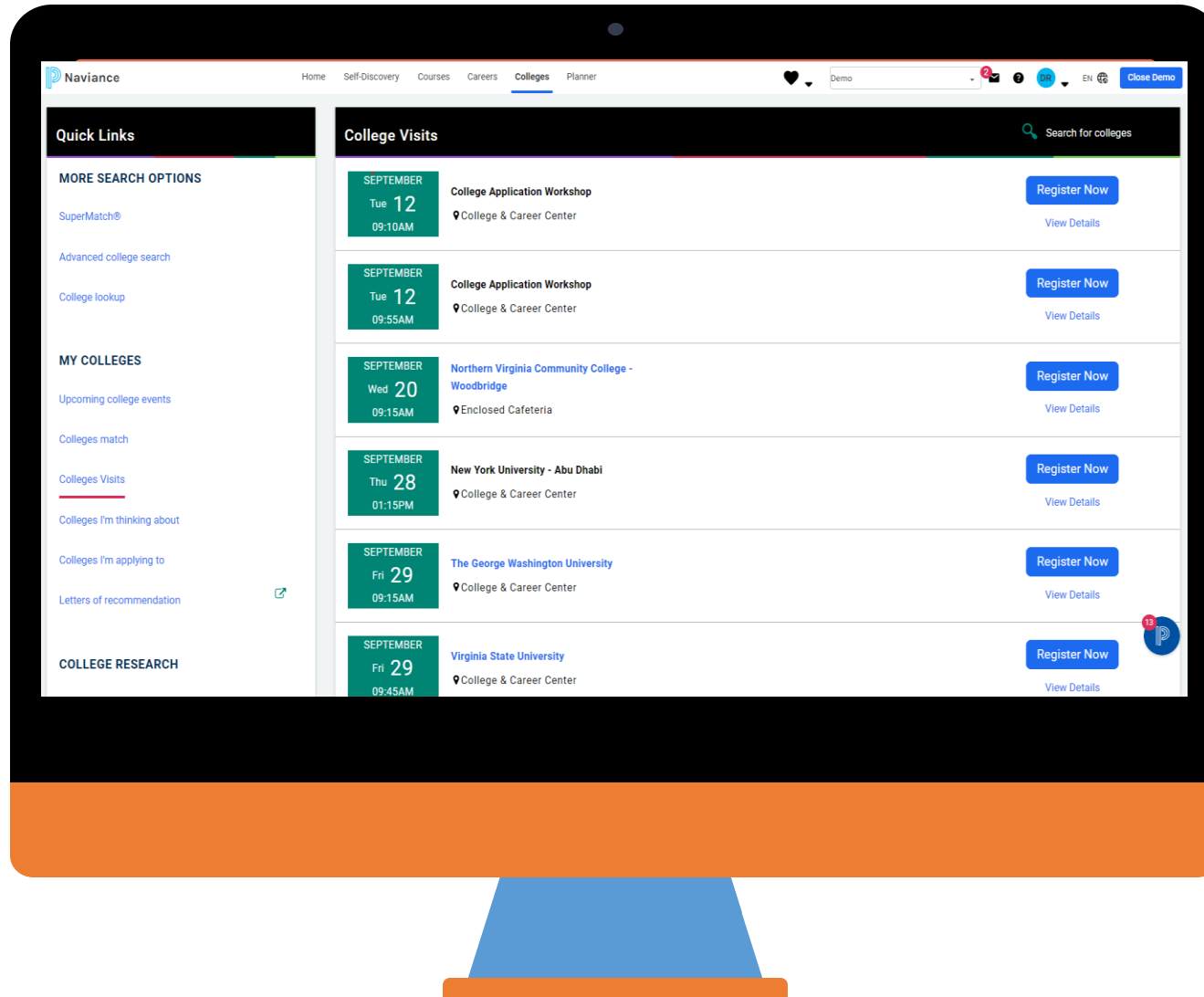

- You must ALSO formally request teacher recommendations through Naviance, before requesting transcripts.
- All requests must be made with **two weeks' notice** prior to your deadlines! (Winter break does not count as 2 weeks' notice.)
- ***Do not send requests through the Common App!***

Counselors

Ask counselors via e-mail, at least two weeks in advance! (Winter break does not count as 2 weeks notice.)

Complete the Counselor Recommendation Questionnaire (found under "About Me," "Surveys from your school") before requesting transcripts as well.
